Why write a new Code of Conduct Handbook?

A new handbook goes hand in hand with a districtwide effort, in collaboration with the Lawrence Teachers' Union, to continue to build a welcoming and supportive climate for all our students.

School Climate

refers to the quality and character of school life and includes norms, beliefs, relationships, teaching and learning practices, as well as organizational and structural features of schools.

Context

- LTU and Central office designees attend American Federation for Teachers' Center for School Improvement Institute (CSI) last Spring, 2019.
 - Three day session is focused on restorative justice practices as a tool for school improvement
- Superintendent Paris and LTU President, Kimberly Barry, commit to a deep dive on restorative practices as a tool in building stronger LPS climate for all students.
 - A collaborative Culture and Climate Steering Committee is launched upon their return from CSI

Context

- Culture and Climate Steering Committee is comprised of 28 members, including:
 - Educators
 - School leaders
 - Central office administrators
- SY 19-20 efforts are prioritized around:
 - Restorative Practices (RP) roll out, implementation and communication measures
 - Code of Conduct Handbook rewrite

The Code of Conduct Handbook is a reflection of our commitment to building a strong school climate for all students. Practices outlined in the handbook must parallel our beliefs.

September 2019 - April 2020:

- Discussion groups regarding the improvements needed
- Research and review of handbooks in communities already committed to Restorative Practices
- Decisions and commitments to develop an easier to read, easier to implement handbook, including simplifying codes for violations of policy or state or federal regulations
- Collaborative writing and editing done in ongoing consultation with LPS legal counsel.
